

A FEW FACTS ABOUT OUR REGION:

- At the time this intervention began, 92% of children in our region living under the federal poverty level or in low-income families resided in 4 of the 12 towns we serve: New Haven, East Haven, West Haven and Hamden. In New Haven, 58%, in Hamden 33%.
- New Haven is a city that suffers from many of the effects of post-industrial poverty.

AMAZING FACT ABOUT NEW HAVEN:

New Haven, CT has the largest number of non-profit organizations per capita than any city its size in the United States.



SECURE START

An initiative to build children's optimal development and school readiness by supporting strong

caregiver -child attachment

at the youngest ages.





- Attachments are the emotional bonds that infants develop with their parents and other key caregivers. It is a core process of child development
- Attachment is universal and present in all cultures.
- Children who are securely attached tend to be:
 - ✓ more socially constructive/less aggressive
 - ✓ more creative and resilient to challenges
 - ✓ able to learn and concentrate more easily

Secure attachment buffers the stress of poverty and trauma.

These advantages persist throughout the lifespan.

WHY CIRCLE OF SECURITY-PARENTING?




- COS-P© applies decades of attachment research in an accessible, non-shaming, non-judgmental, 8 week intervention.
- Utilized in a variety of settings by a diverse set of providers.
- Takes the position of positive intentionality- that all parents want what is best for their children.
- Helps caregivers acquire basic and fundamental relationship capabilities.

PARENT ATTENDING TO THE CHILD'S NEEDS



IMPORTANT CONCEPTS LEARNED FROM COS-P

- "Good enough" parenting.
- It's never too late.
- The importance of reflecting on our own past to better understand what is happening now with our child.
- Importance of co-regulation to impact self-regulation.
- Behavior is an expression of a need.

WHAT MAKES COS-P© DIFFERENT?

- Focus is on the caregiver behaviors.
- Enhances caregiver sensitivity- the ability to mentalize or imagine what is going on inside the child.
- Fosters self-reflection on their own experience of being parented and its effects on their parenting now.
- A relational versus a behavioral model.

AND SO IT BEGAN.....

- RFPs were distributed to agencies in the region offering to train staff to facilitate COS-P© groups.
- 5 agencies were chosen for the first year.
- MOUs were drawn up outlining responsibilities.

- Agencies received funding for incentives for caregivers to participate. \$1,000.00 per group
- Expectation for agency to participate in the evaluation process.
- Expectation for the partners to attend Secure Start Network meetings.
- Expectation for partners to file an annual final report.

Funding provides for parent incentives at the discretion of the agency: i.e., food for the sessions, child care, transportation, graduation gifts, celebration of completion. \$1000.00 per group

Secure Start: FY2013-2023

- Began with 5 Agencies currently the network includes 11 agencies.
- Secure Start Network Meetings: quarterly.
- Number of COS-P© groups held: 151.
- Number of caregivers and educators impacted: 1,462.
- Groups offered in English and Spanish and for specialized groups.
- 2-session Refreshers held at 3 agencies.
- Educator coaching groups at 2 agencies.



QUARTERLY SECURE START NETWORK MEETINGS

- Provides a space to discuss best practices and fidelity to the model.
- Fosters collaboration and sharing of resources.
- Creates a community of practice and a shared sense of promoting secure attachment in the region.
- Participants share impact stories from their COS-P© groups.

SECURE START TODAY

1. UW funding is now 1500.00 per group.

2. Participants fill out a self-reflection evaluation survey and receive 20.00 gift cards.

3. Partners attend a quarterly Secure Start Network meeting.

4. For some agencies UWGNH provides experienced COS-P© facilitators.

5. Facilitators fill out a group report following each group.

6. I meet with each partner at the mid-point and end of year and file an end -of -year report and budget proposal for the following year.

Secure Start Evaluation:2017



- Parental Reflective Function Questionnaire (PRFQ)
- Parenting Sense of Competency (PSOC)
- Patient Health Questionairre-9 (PHQ-9)
- Parenting Stress Index Short Form (PSI-SF)
- DEX (measure of executive function)
- Child-Parent Relationship Scale (CPRS)
- Baseline, T1, T2, Post, 3 month follow-up

Total sample: 58 parents in published results; 66 recent pairs

Reduction in maternal depression.

TRENDS FROM MORE CURRENT EVALUATIONS

• My level of parenting stress: decrease

• I identify and respond to my child's needs to explore and for comfort and care: **increase**

• I step back and think about what my child's behavior is telling me before I react: **increase**


 I feel confident I can meet the emotional needs of my child/children in my group: increase

LESSONS LEARNED

- Go where the children are: childcare, preschools, family resource centers, mental health clinics, home visiting programs.
- Build on relationships where there is already trust.
- Mentor the facilitators- co-facilitation.
- Be creative with funding streams.
- Be flexible with time and space.

NEW DIRECTIONS

- Refresher: 2 sessions exploring the big ideas from COS-P©: applications and impact.
- Exploring the idea of a group for partners of the reentry program.
- Improving and strengthening the evaluation process.
- One-to-one COS-P© in home visiting and in behavioral health clients.
- Offering COS-C© to early childhood educators.
